

NSMQT PSAT

- October 12, 2022 from 1pm-4pm
- The Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) is a standardized test administered by the College Board and cosponsored by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC).
- It provides an opportunity to practice for the SAT.
- It is used to determine eligibility and qualification for the National Merit Scholarship Program.
- Of the roughly 1.6 million students who take the test about 7,500 are awarded various scholarships.
- The scholarship has three award types—National Merit \$2500, Corporate-Sponsored Merit Scholarship awards, and College-Sponsored Merit awards.

If you want to play sports at an NCAA Division I or II school, start by registering for a Certification Account with the NCAA Eligibility Center at eligibilitycenter.org. If you want to play Division III sports or you are not sure where you want to compete, start by creating a Profile Page at eligibilitycenter.org.

ACADEMIC REQUIREMENTS: To play sports at a Division I or II school, you must graduate from high school, complete 16 NCAA-approved core courses, earn a minimum GPA and earn an ACT or SAT score that matches your core-course GPA.

GRADE-POINT AVERAGE The NCAA Eligibility Center calculates your grade-point average based only on the grades you earn in NCAA-approved core courses. • DI requires a minimum 2.3 GPA. • DII requires a minimum 2.2 GPA.

SLIDING SCALE Divisions I and II use sliding scales to match test scores and GPAs to determine eligibility. The sliding scale balances your test score with your GPA. If you have a low test score, you need a higher GPA to be eligible. Find more information about test scores at ncaa.org/test-scores.

NCAA Eligibility Continued

TEST SCORES You may take the SAT or ACT an unlimited number of times before you enroll
full time in college. Every time you register for the SAT or ACT, use the NCAA Eligibility
Center code 9999 to send your scores directly to NCAA from the testing agency. They
accept official scores only from the ACT or SAT and won't use scores shown on your high
school transcript. If you take either test more than once, the best subscore from different
tests are used to give you the best possible score.



Check with your counselor to make sure you are on track to complete the required number of NCAA-approved courses and graduate on time with your class.

• Take the ACT or SAT and submit your scores to the NCAA Eligibility Center using code 9999.

• Ensure your sports participation information is correct in your Eligibility Center account.

• At the end of the year, ask your counselor at each high school or program you attended to upload your official transcript to your NCAA Eligibility Center account.

HOPE vs ZELL MILLER SCHOLARSHIP

HOPE

- Must be a legal resident of GA
- Must be a graduate of an eligible high school with 4 units of rigor
- A GPA of 3.0 in core courses
- Must maintain a 3.0 GPA in college
- If male, must have registered for selective service

- Must be a legal resident of GA
- Must be a graduate of an eligible high school with 4 units of rigor
